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**Pastor Keith L. DeVries Writes:**

## **"A Very Different World"**

We are living in a very different world today than we did only a few weeks ago, or for that matter only a few hours ago. In order to contain the spread of COVID-19, we have been directed by the State of California and the County of Sacramento to live our lives differently, not in fear, but with extreme caution to protect ourselves and each other from the spread of this virus. To that end, your staff and session have prayerfully decided to make major decisions to our life and ministry together as God's people:

- Close the campus to all meetings, events, and gatherings, including worship services effective March 18.
- The Food Closet remains open as it is considered essential to the health and well-being of our community. Food Closet Director **Terryl Summers** and her crew have implemented daily sanitizing procedures

and have modified the distribution process so that volunteers have NO direct contact with the public to maintain proper social distancing.

- Move all worship services to live streaming – see page 1 for directions on how to connect. And a plethora of thanks to **Steve Parker** for all of his work setting it up!
- **Pastor Ivan** is offering an intergenerational Christian education experience via Zoom each Sunday. The link is included in each week's *eParish Notes*. He is also hosting a prayer time on Facebook at noon each day. Follow Carmichael Presbyterian Church on Facebook to see it.
- The Post Office is holding all CPC mail. I am picking it up several times a week and delivering important items to appropriate individuals.
- **Paul Shultz**, our Financial

Administrator, is processing all of your contributions as you continue to support our common ministry. See page 3 for information on ways to give beyond the offering plate.

- The office staff is working remotely to keep us all informed and actively engaged in shared ministry throughout the duration of this global crisis.
- If you have a prayer request or any need for pastoral care, either for yourself or another member or friend of CPC, please contact me or Pastor Ivan via email or by leaving a message on our voicemail, (see page 11 for email addresses and voicemail extensions) or call either of us at the home numbers listed in the church directory. We are checking all of these on a regular basis.
- The Lenten devotional that has been included in your Sunday bulletin will be included in the weekly worship email. This past week's theme is *"Letting go of fear and holding on to God's peace,"* how appropriate for these uncertain times.

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# Best Practices to Prevent Illness

Here are some best health practices to prevent colds and flu of any kind but of most concern, COVID-19. Right now most cases are mild but those over 60 with underlying health concerns are most vulnerable.

1. Stay home as much as you can. When you do go out, maintain a 6-foot distance between yourself and others.
2. Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after going to the bathroom; before eating; and after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing.
3. *Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.*
4. Use ONLY your knuckle to touch light switches, elevator buttons, etc..
5. When putting gas in your car, use a paper towel or disposable glove to lift the nozzle.
6. Open doors with your closed fist or hip - do not grasp the handle with your hand, unless there is no other way to open the door, especially important on bathroom and post office/commercial doors.
7. Use disinfectant wipes at the stores when they are



available, including wiping the handle and child seat in grocery carts.

8. If soap and water are not readily available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol. Always wash hands with soap and water if hands are visibly dirty.
9. **Stay home when you are sick.** (fever, sniffing, sneezing, coughing). Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash.
10. Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects such as doorknobs, phones, computer components and surfaces using a regular household cleaning spray or wipe.
11. Masks have not been shown to be part of preventative action and are generally best for those who are actively ill.
12. Please keep in touch with our shut-ins and vulnerable members to make sure they are doing well.
13. Do not panic.....80% of those who have become ill have mild symptoms.

## “Be Still & Know that I Am God”



Are you living in fear in these turbulent times? Are you increasingly

# Mission on the Move

This month the Mission Division is reporting on a project that CPC supports. The first recipient of funds from our Global Ecumenical Budget for 2019 was Jeshua Holmes.

This is an update on his activities.

Jeshua was a student at CSUS who graduated with a BA in Government. He worked as

an intern in the California State Senate during his last semester. After that experience he looked for a project that he could apply the lessons he had learned to make a difference for underserved people somewhere in the world. He found International Justice Mission (IJM). This agency is a global organization that works in countries across the world to combat modern slavery, including sex trafficking and forced labor. Jeshua took what he calls “a step of faith” and accepted a year-long position with IJM. He is working in a major South Asian city supporting the government in enforcing the laws on these issues, training local officials to be aware of human slavery, and providing care to victims rescued from slavery and in some cases their children.



In Jeshua’s words “This position allows me to combine my passion for public service and my heart to serve those experiencing suffering in this world, all while serving the Lord”. I

have assisted my team with organizing a conference between representatives from law enforcement, the judiciary, academia, and the social jus-

tice sector. The objective of the event was to foster dialogue between these groups regarding best methods for combating commercial sexual exploitation. The discourse was extremely fruitful, and I was encouraged to see professors, police officers, community organizers, and judges working together to find ways to end human trafficking. Furthermore, I had the chance to attend the opening of a Child Welfare Council (CWC) office, which handles the custody of children who have been removed from abusive environments. The CWC office will have child-friendly facilities aimed at ensuring the comfort of the child (as opposed to more barren government offices which CWC affairs have traditionally been conducted in). In addition, the CWC provides housing to children of

commercial sex workers who are unable to care for them. We had a number of rescues throughout this month. While I cannot give specific details as these cases are still ongoing, I want to convey that a number of minors have been removed from sexually exploitative situations as a result of our efforts and God’s grace. In addition, our office opened a Legal Aid Centre (LAC) in a less socio-economically advantaged neighborhood in our city. The key aim of the LAC is to provide legal remedy to victims of commercial sexual violence who may not have historically been informed of how the law can assist them.

*Editor’s Note: Jeshua has since arrived safely back in the United States after being sent home during the Coronavirus outbreak.*


# When Facing Difficulties

When we are feeling overwhelmed or fearful, it is hard to get through each day. It is easy to let ourselves start feeling defeated or panicky when we don't see a clear path forward out of our difficulties. We may be experiencing chronic illness, cancer diagnosis, divorce, the loss of a loved one or a job, or any other kind of life-altering situation. It may feel like we're in a never-ending rut; we've been trying the same things over and over without any discernible progress. That's a similar problem that several disciples were having in John 21. They'd been fishing all night without catching a single fish. When Jesus told them to cast their nets on the other side of the boat, they must have first thought, "That's crazy; how can that help?" But they followed his suggestion and caught so many fish, they could hardly haul them all in. They were willing to accept help, to listen to another's perspective. However, breaking away from our old tried-and-true way of doing things can fill us with anxiety and scary feelings. It may involve letting go of something we fear we can't do without, and often involves letting someone else see us vulnerable.

When grieving or dealing with challenging situations,

it's difficult to believe the scripture from 2 Timothy 1:7, *For God did not give us a spirit of timidity, but a spirit of power, of love and of self-discipline.*



Paul was urging Timothy to be bold and to rely on the power of the Holy Spirit to overcome his fears.

How do we get to the point where we can do this? Reading the Bible and insightful devotionals, and talking with pastors and other believers can definitely help. Another excellent resource is to ask for a Stephen Minister. Stephen Ministers are trained to offer an empathetic, non-judgmental, listening ear and confidential support on a one-to-one basis. No one (except the Stephen Minister Referral

Coordinator, **Kelly Holland**) even knows that you have a Stephen Minister, unless you choose to tell someone. A Stephen Minister walks alongside you on your journey of self-discovery, helping you brainstorm, allowing you to vent or cry when needed, praying for and with you, affirming and encouraging you.

This PW Bible Study by Eugenia Anne Gamble helps us look at the Ten Commandments of the Old Testament with fresh insights. These 'Ten Words' can be seen as a personal love letter from God to each of us—and to all generations.

April: The Ninth Word—*"You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor."* (Exodus 20:16)

Scripture: Exodus 20:16, Deuteronomy 5:20 and Matthew 12:36-37

Purpose: Trust in our justice system and basic honesty is important to communities.

Prayer: *Gracious God, your word to us is always faithful and true. We thank you, Jesus, our heart and life, you are the way and the truth for us. Help us, Lord, to live in the truth. Help us to be mindful of the words we speak. Make us trustworthy witnesses so that your love and truth can spread from us as a sweet fragrance in our troubled world. In Jesus' holy name we pray. Amen.*

Through this Bible Study we begin to realize just how cherished we are, opening our eyes to see that all people are God's beloved. God invites us to re-center our lives, to honor all life, and to be honest and truthful with one another in everything we do.

Lies can set in motion dynamics that cut to the heart of


relationships, community, and the fabric that holds society together. How do we hold together as a community if we cannot trust one another? The Ninth Word states that God's people are not to lie or be deceitful. Do not utter words that injure others, harm the heart, or take people's power and self-esteem from them.

Telling the truth must be at

the heart of the legal system and at the heart of society. In fact, telling the truth is a form of loving one's neighbors. Ephesians 4 reminds us that the truth must also be spoken in love. Truth hurled as a weapon at a loved one or enemy is never appropriate. The courage to face the truth can make us free (John 8:32), but the truth should never be used as an excuse to demean, manipulate or gossip.

The Ninth Word calls us to inner thoughtfulness. It in-

# Per Capita 2020-What's That?

Per Capita is a fundamental way in which all of the nearly 10,000 congregations and mid councils of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) connect, participate and share in the work of the wider church. Per capita is the primary source of funding for the Office of the General Assembly, and is how Presbyterians mutually and equitably share the costs of coming together to discern the Spirit's leading for the future.

Per Capita is a set amount per member that each congregation should pay annually to the larger Presbyterian Church (USA). It is part of the glue that holds Presbyterians together and has a long history dating back to 1734. Per Capita funds are pooled together from all congregations and used to fund the following important services:

- The General Assembly meeting every two years where Presbyterians gather together to worship and discern the mind of Christ for the church.
- Administration/support of mission work
- Production of Presbyterian resources, such as the *Book of Order* and the *Book of Confes-*

sions in several languages.

- The Presbyterian Historical Society that preserves and shares the Presbyterian experience for future generations
- Preparation, administration and grading of standard ordination examinations for seminary students
- Annual training events for presbytery executives, stated clerks and others who help lead our work and mission
- Pastoral support for immigrant fellowships



Individual per capita participation this year is \$30.00--less than \$3.00 per month for each member. The \$30.00 is based on the following--\$8.95 for General Assembly, \$5.22 for Synod of the Pacific, \$14.83 for the Presbytery of Sacramento and \$1.00 for the Pastoral Emergency Care Fund. Based on CPC's current members, our congregation's contribution is budgeted at \$16,170 this year.

To date, we have collected 24% of our annual per capita obligation. We will make our full annual payment even if we have not received all of the congregation's per capita payments from our members. Our goal is for each CPC member

to contribute their per capita amount each year so our payment to the Presbytery is fully funded.

If you have made your 2020 per capita payment of \$30.00 per member, **THANK YOU!** If you have not made your 2020 payment, please do so as soon as possible using the special blue envelope provided in your offering envelope box. If you are missing your per capita envelope, you may use a pew envelope marked with your envelope number. Or, you may simply mail your check to the church office. Please be sure to show your envelope number on your check and mark it for Per Capita 2020. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact **Paul Shultz**, Financial Administrator.
