Pastor Keith L. DeVries Writes:

"The World Looks Different Somehow"

I am slowly coming to the conclusion that the world we live in is different and that wearing a face covering may just be our new normal in public settings. When CPC reo-

pens for in-person worship (more about that in a moment), we will most likely all be required to wear a mask and practice social distancing in order to protect ourselves and others. I am pretty sure Je-

sus would approve of this new normal as a way to follow his teaching to "love your neighbor as yourself." And even though we sometimes fall into the COVID-19 creep (you know, those times you forget to keep your distance and gradually get closer to another person while you're engaged in a conversation), we must continue to be on our guard to

minimize the risk to one another. Beware of a false sense of security; this coronavirus is still out there, and we all need to be careful and disciplined even when it is hard.

Your Reopening Task Force continues to meet as they map out a very cautious approach to reopening our campus. They are developing a survey of the congregation to help guide their recommendations, knowing that any decision could be retracted as things change. As

of this writing, the task force is looking at a phased-in approach, first opening the church office for limited days and hours, allowing staff to both work in the office and work from home. In-person worship is still a way off, as we figure out how to prepare the sanctuary and conduct worship so that everyone who comes to CPC is protected. It

will be a learning experience for all of us as we practice social distancing, sanitizing, safety measures, and new ways of being together. It is certain to look and feel different than before COVID-19. Sunday morning livestreaming will continue even after we resume in-person worship.

The world also looks very different in terms of social justice and racial inequality. Just when we thought we had our hands full with the coronavirus, we witness the brutal killing of Ahmaud Aubrey and George Floyd, sparking civil unrest and calls for justice. People have, with some exceptions, been marching peacefully in the streets for more than 20 straight days, making their voices heard in calling for change. As a nation we still haven't healed from the sin of slavery, and even as we make progress in bringing true equality for all, we take several steps back again when we grow complacent or silent. But this time feels different; this time feels like real change may emerge from voices across generational and racial divides crying out for justice, for transformation, and for equality. Members of this faith community are talking about how we can make a difference, how we can make our voices heard, how we can truly em-(Continued on page 3)

- Dismantling structural racism
- Eradicating systemic poverty.

What this means for Carmichael Presbyterian Church is that we will build congregational vitality by continuing to reach out to the least of these in Carmichael through the Food Closet, Supper on Saturday, the shower ministry and the Deacons discretionary fund. We will also work with the Carmichael (HART) Homeless Assistance Resource Team to eradicate poverty. In addition, the Mission Division will challenge Session and Deacons to examine their various ministries and where appropriate look for ways that their ministries address one or more of the foci.

Ironically May 25 was the day the focus on dismantling structural racism became a national one. The death of George Floyd has sparked a response from people all over

America. Many here at Carmichael began asking **what can** we do?

The Mission Division feels this is a time for us to move beyond our comfort zone and

look at structural racism and justice for all. We know we are all created equal in the image of God and that God's

grace is given to each of us. We are also told in Micah 6:8 that in response to that knowledge of God's love we are required to "act justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with our God.".

The Mission Division encourages each of you to read Matthew 25 and find ways to challenge yourself and your

beliefs on racial justice. Most of us do not feel we are racist, but if we are white, we look at the world differently than our brothers and sisters of color. This has been a systemic prob-

> lem in America for 400 years. There are many websites and reading lists that offer insights into what it is like to be a person of color in America. On the CPC website we have listed a variety

of resources for children and adults that talk about racism and justice. We are also exploring ways to begin dialogue in small groups where we can talk about how we are called to be Matthew 25 people in this place and time in our history. In addition, when we once again can be together in larger groups, we will invite people from our congregation and community to share their stories.



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Seemingly Unanswered Prayers

God promises to be with us when we face trials and tells us that we will benefit from them. James 1: 2-3 even says to, "Consider it pure joy, my brothers [and sisters], whenever

you face trials of many kinds because you know that the testing of your faith develops perseverance." James isn't saying that



we should *enjoy* suffering: suffering *is* suffering. Nor should we pretend to be happy when we're facing trials, however, we can have a positive outlook knowing that God is with us. We know God is using life's difficulties to build our character by strengthening us and giving us opportunities to learn from the challenges presented. Among other things, we can learn perseverance, compassion for others, and we can deepen our faith.

June 6th's *Upper Room* illustrated this for me. Tim, a teenager, prayed continuously for something that seemed in line with God's purpose. Yet, he didn't get what he prayed for. Tim didn't turn from God because his prayer seemed unanswered. Instead, he interpreted that as God saying, "Not yet." (In a similar situation, many of us might have interpreted God to be ignoring our

prayers.) In Tim's case, he learned to depend on God and to seek to help others in similar situations as his. Later, he was able to recognize the good that came out of his seemingly

unanswered pray-

When we're in the midst of stress, uncertainty, anxiety, grief, loss of income, and other losses because of the

Covid-19 pandemic, it may be difficult to trust or even see that God is with us. Our anxieties are intensified because of the need to continue physical distancing and sheltering-inplace. We can't get together with others in Christian fellowship like we used to be able to do. We grieve that loss.

Consider whether a weekly phone call from a compassionate Stephen Minister could be beneficial to you! Think about how talking with someone who listens empathetically to what you say is going on with you and cares about how you're feeling could help. A Stephen Minister has been trained to be a confidential sounding board, to help you sort out how you're feeling and what steps you might take to improve your situation. He or she can help you see how God has been there for you in

the past, and support you as you get through your challenging time now.

If you or someone you know is in a place of life where you need someone to listen and for the hand of Christian love to be extended to you, our Stephen Ministry can play an important role. For more information, contact any of the Stephen Leaders:

2020-2021 PW Bible Study

Into the Light: Finding Hope Through Prayers of Lament

On March 29, 2017, PW Bible study committee selected P. Lynn Miller's proposal to write and create the art for a study based on lament. Lynn is the first author to both write and illustrate a PW/Horizons Bible study. I would like to share a few excerpts from the study's introduction.

War, sickness, death, unfulfilled lives, and threats to creation and to society all cause us to look to God for relief of our pain. How do we as followers of Christ acknowledge that, even as we work to change them, the existence of these things works against God's purpose for the world.

Current practice turns these and many of society's controversial issues into a fight between 'us" and "them." In an argument like this, the first step is to choose a side. The

second step is to dehumanize those who have chosen the side that is not our own. Each side hurls accusations and insults at the other on social media, television news, and in printed media. The result is very little movement toward addressing the actual issue.

Our faith offers another option: lament.

But how do we lament? Have we forgotten – or never learned – how to lament? A study of Biblical lament that includes opportunities to reclaim the practice of lament can help us live faithfully in this in-between time, engaging the real world with our faith and our faith with the real world.

This study was selected in 2017 to be used in 2020. Timely? I definitely see God's Hands at work. Women in PW Circles will be receiving the study guide through their Circle Leaders. Frequently asked question: Can others participate in the study? Answer: YES! At this time what we do not know is how Circles will be gathering. What we do know is: 1. Circle members will continue to stay connected. 2. You are invited to contact any Circle Leader to learn more about PW, and, 3. A Pastor led study will take place on Zoom each month starting in September. These meetings usually take place the 2nd Thursday of the month at 9:30 am.
