Pastor Keith L. DeVries Writes: "What Reopening Looks Like??"

It is hard to believe, but our campus has been closed for nearly 12 weeks now – three months! In that time, we have established new routines and ways of being in community and become well acquainted with Zoom meetings - way too many Zoom meetings! We have established and finetuned live streaming worship services and recreated how we gather as a worshiping community, even sharing the Lord's Supper virtually. Our Food Closet has modified procedures to allow for social distancing and no-contact food pick up. We have suffered some financial loss but are holding our own so far with a few adjustments.

As I write this article, all 50 states are working toward reopening over the course of several months which leads us into considering what reopening CPC might look like so we are as prepared as possible when we receive clearance to reopen from Sacramento County health officials. As we begin to plan, we recognize that reopening our campus will be much more difficult than closing it was. To help us through this monumental process, your Session has established a Reopening Task Force to provide guidance in the coming months.

The Reopening Task Force

will consider how and when to resume worship, group meetings, and church office operations. Regarding worship and fellowship, they will look at how to maintain social dis-

tancing in the Sanctuary, Gathering Place, and McMillen Hall, including limiting in person attendance and suspending coffee fellowship and common meals

(yes, this will be extremely hard for Presbyterians who love to eat), and how to meet safety and sanitizing standards for our worship spaces. They will also make recommendations for group meetings, possibly opening to CPC small groups at first, and gradually resuming small nonchurch groups and not allowing any large group gatherings until we have been given permission by the County.

There are more factors to consider in reopening the church office, including: opening in phases (i.e. reopen the church office part time for staff only, then gradually increase

hours and access for CPC members and the general public), installing plexiglass barriers in the front office/ reception area, adding markings on floors and walkways

to ensure social distancing, allowing no more than 10 staff members in the office at one time, wearing masks in common areas, and es-

tablishing a rigorous cleaning and disinfecting schedule.

COVID-19 is not going away any time soon; we must be careful and deliberate in how and when we reopen. Even when we are told we can gather together in person to worship, we know that some will not feel comfortable doing so until there is a vaccine available for the general population.

The life of this faith community has changed and will continue to change, but just to be clear, even though the church campus has been

A Story from Our Afghan Refugee Project

I have been concerned about how our friends who come to the ESL Women's Classes at CPC were doing in this unusual crisis. Since they don't read or understand English news reports, I thought it must be distressing and difficult to deal with all the requirements while keeping kids inside and entertained. I saw on my email that World Relief was asking for people to donate arts and craft supplies and educational material for the children of these women.

I thought "What can I do for this project?" I finally cleaned out my

office closet and craft supplies in our She Shed. I had a pile of supplies on my dining room table. We aren't entertaining, so our table had become the gathering place for the family. Jigsaw puzzle at one end, sewing machine at the other end, and now the ESL project in the middle.

I put out a call to my Carmichael Kiwanis, my Elsdon Circle neighbors, and CPC friends. Low and behold, many folks responded. The biggest contributor was **Kristen Miller** and her two children, **Joy** and **Ryan**. They brought me two huge totes of books.

After a lengthy visit to the Dollar Tree Store (with my face mask and rubber gloves), I was ready to pack my bags. World Relief sent me the names of the moms in our CPC program, their addresses and the kids' ages and sexes. I was able to include the following in every bag: scissors, glue sticks, pencils, crayons, age appropriate work books, colored craft paper, puzzles, small toys, and at least three or four books.

My husband, Tom, and I spent two days delivering bags to families up and down Marconi. We were greeted with smiles and laughter from the moms and dads, and much excitement from the kids!

My hope was to not only give the kids some fun, but to let the refuge families know that they are very welcome in Carmichael and that we care about them at CPC.

We are able in a small way to support these ministries. However, some of our partners are not included in our annual budget and depend on special offerings. Two of these partners are Pastors **Joseph and Florence Kaweesa** in those partners is Students Helping Honduras

(SHH). Our youth and some adults from our congregation and the Sacramento area have made a number of trips to Honduras to help build schools. The most recent Sacramento Mission Team had to leave Honduras in March (after one day) because of the COVID-19 pandemic, it became apparent quickly that financial support for SHH was going to be in dire straits. All colleges that support SHH (90+% of SHH's financial

that provides education to hundreds of students in grades 1 – 12 and the Children's Home (24 boys and 24 girls) were in jeopardy of closing permanently. The SHH Directors met and created a stable/ sustainable funding program to keep these mis-

sions sustainable into the future called Tigers Club. Tigers Club is a program where you can donate \$30 monthly (\$1/ day) to provide financial stability to the Bilingual School and Children's Home. The Directors have determined that 390 donors keep the lights on and 780 donors allow the Bilingual School to provide a complete program when the school is allowed to reopen. I received an email recently that SHH has 397 donors so far. If you would like to become a

Comfort in the Storm

Unfortunately, it seems it's usually necessary for us to experience pain and suffering in our lives before we can then feel compassion for others. If we have never experienced

feelings like disappointment, apprehension, uncertainty, pain, or feeling overwhelmed we would probably

have no idea what someone else might be experiencing and feeling. This is why we are particularly comforted knowing that Jesus lived on earth, and doing so, experienced all our emotions. We know that God truly understands all our pain, fears, and suffering, because Jesus lived and experienced them firsthand. This is true anytime, and especially now with the impact of Covid-19. We are all experiencing 'being in the same *storm*, even if we're not all in the same *boat*.' That is, we all are feeling many of the same fears and uncertainties because of the pandemic (the storm); however, we may be in different 'boats' as some of us are also experiencing job or income loss, struggling to teach our children at home while working, fearing bringing the virus home to our families, worrying about the future, etc.

We know God is good, yet we may question why this is happening. As I see it, God doesn't want us to be hurt;

> nevertheless, God allows us to experience pain and difficult situations so we can feel compassion for and then comfort oth-

ers. The Message, paraphrasing 2 Cor 1:4, explains it this way, " [God] comes alongside us when we go through hard times, and before you know it, he brings us alongside someone else who is going through hard times so we can be there for that person just as God was there for us."

When God comforts us, that doesn't mean that all our troubles will disappear. Being comforted can also mean being strengthened, encouraged and given hope to deal with our troubles. This kind of "comfort" is also what Stephen Ministers offer. Besides their own experiences, Stephen Ministers have received 50+ hours of Christian caregiving training in confidentiality, listening, offering feedback without telling someone what to do, empathetic responding, prayer, and telephone helping.

God wants us to seek and receive comfort during any difficult time! Allowing a Stephen Minister to offer you God's comfort and encouragement, is one way you can do this. If you or someone you know is in a place of life where you need someone to listen and for the hand of Christian love to be extended to you, our Stephen Ministry can play an important role.
