
PRAYER OF CONFESSION AND ASSURANCE OF PARDON

CHRISTMAS PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE AND THE LORD'S PRAYER

Pastor: God of starlit skies and quiet wonder, on this holy night we welcome the Christ child once more – with hearts full of gratitude and eyes lifted toward hope. As we gather beneath the shimmer of sanctuary lights or beside glowing fireplaces at home, remind us again that your love meets us wherever we are. That your promises arrive not in power or splendor, but in the cry of a newborn and the courage of a young mother.

Silence

Pastor: We give thanks for this story – ancient and ever new – of angels and shepherds, of good news and great joy. We rejoice in the gifts of this season: the laughter of children, the warmth of gathered families, the beauty of music echoing through cold winter air. Let our celebration not end at our tables or trees, but spill out into the world in kindness, generosity, and compassion.

Silence

Pastor: Holy One, this has been a year of both beauty and burden. In a world aching with division and fatigue, you arrive – not with judgment, but with mercy. Not to condemn, but to heal. Not in dominance, but in tenderness. You draw near to the forgotten, the weary, the displaced. You call us to do the same. Widen our welcome. Stretch our empathy. Teach us again how to love one another across differences, across fear, across the distances we've allowed to grow between us.

Silence

Pastor: Emmanuel, God-with-us: we name those who are hurting tonight. Those who grieve an empty chair at the table. Those whose hearts feel far from peace. Those overwhelmed by anxiety, addiction, illness, or isolation.

Silence

Pastor: Shine your light on all who sit in shadow. Break into the silent nights of the lonely and the lost. Bring healing where there is pain, courage where there is fear, and provision where there is need.

Silence

Pastor: Let the birth of Christ remind us that nothing is beyond redemption. Nothing so distant it cannot be drawn near. Nothing so dark that the light of Christ cannot illuminate it.

Silence

Pastor: May hope rise in us tonight – not because the world is easy, but because Christ has come. May we bear witness to love in every word, every act of care, every risk of grace. And may the wonder of this night awaken in us a holy imagination for the days ahead.

Silence

Pastor: Now, gathered as your people, we pray as Christ taught us, saying:

All: Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen.



COMMUNION OF THE PEOPLE

If you are worshiping in person, please come down the center aisle to receive the communion elements. You can choose intinction (dipping the bread into the cup) from the servers nearest the center aisle or bread and individual cups from the servers nearest the outside aisles;

partake and return to your seat using the side aisles.

All communion bread is gluten free.

Ushers will bring communion to the seats of those who cannot come forward.

The Lord's Supper and Its Symbolism

The Lord's Supper has special significance as it commemorates the last meal Jesus shared with his disciples until he ate with them in the Kingdom of Cod (Luke 22:16). Bread was and is a common staple which Jesus used as a symbol for his body, broken into pieces to demonstrate giving of himself to others.

Wine was also a common staple in the first century and its consumption was part of everyday life. When Jesus shares the cup, it is a symbol of his blood shed and the sacrifice of his life for all humanity. The sharing of this very common meal was and is a way of enjoying an ongoing relationship with Jesus Christ. "For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes." (1 Corinthians 11:26)

Instructions for Lighting Your Candle

As we reflect upon the light of God's love which is revealed to us in the birth of Jesus Christ, we light candles to remind us that God's love brings light in the darkness. Tonight, just prior to singing "Silent Night," all of the lights in the Sanctuary will be turned off. When Pastor Keith and Pastor Iyan turn on their candles, you are invited to turn on your candle using the switch at the bottom symbolizing how the light of God's love comes into the world. Please turn off your candle following the benediction and place it in a basket in the Narthex as you exit.

Silent Night, Holy Night

This Christmas hymn was originally written by Joseph Mohr for a Christmas festival at St. Nicholas Church, Oberndorf, near Salzburg, Austria. The story is told that the organ was not functioning the day of the service and Mohr decided to write a new hymn that would not require organ accompaniment. He took it to his friend, Franz Xaver Gruber, and asked him to write a suitable tune. The two sang the new hymn as Gruber accompanied on the guitar. The village choir joined in, repeating the last line of each stanza in four-part harmony. As we sing this hymn tonight, may we lift our voices in prayerful praise with those who have been singing this hymn since 1831.
