Pastor: He gives us an example and a commandment ever-new:


People: **to love one another as he has loved us.**

JESUS WASHES HIS DISCIPLES' FEET

SCRIPTURE

John 13:3-10a, 12-17

³ Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands and that he had come from God and was going to God, ⁴ got up from supper, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. ⁵ Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. ⁶ He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" ⁷ Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." ⁸ Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." ⁹ Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" ¹⁰ Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean."

¹² After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had reclined again, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you?" ¹³ You call me Teacher and Lord, and you are right, for that is what I am. ¹⁴ So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. ¹⁵ For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. ¹⁶ Very truly, I tell you, slaves are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. ¹⁷ If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

LITANY OF FOOT WASHING

Pastor: Loving God, as Jesus took a basin and poured the water long ago, we bring these basins of water before you. Bless this water for washing, and bless the hands and feet of your servants, too. Wash away the stains and strains of this life, we pray, that we may walk anew in the ways of Christ. In true humility, we bend our lives in service to you. Help us all, by your example, to grow in understanding: how for love's sake we are meant to serve rather than be served. In Christ we pray.

INVITATION TO HAND AND FOOT WASHING

*Maundy Thursday reminds us that Jesus became the servant of all
as he washed his disciples' feet and in that act, calls us to be a servant people.
You are invited to journey to one of the foot or hand washing stations in the Sanctuary,
or you may remain seated to reflect and pray.*

PRAYERS OF INTERCESSION

Pastor: God of tenderness and compassion, on the night before he died, Jesus set a table for his disciples. Those who would soon deny, betray, and scatter. All gathered together. They took off their sandals and sat down in the presence of their Teacher and Lord, who washed their feet, one by one.

We pray for people whose feet are tired and dusty from hard labor; for those whose backs are bent by care or worry; those laid low by illness or guilt or grief. Wash away, we pray, the tiredness of our bodies and souls. Hold gently in your healing hands the broken places in our lives and relationships. Be our company in isolation, our source of hope in despair, and the way forward at every dead end.

God of all good gifts, thank you for setting a table of welcome for everyone; for making room whether we are faithful or faithless or failures. We pray that all who are hungry will find enough to eat and clean water to drink as we share and live more responsibly. Teach us to sit down with enemies, sharing common meals and common hopes. Make us true servants of yours for the sake of the world. Teach us to love as you love for the sake of the world. In Christ's name we pray.

GREAT PRAYER OF THANKSGIVING

Pastor: The Lord be with you.

People: And also with you.

Pastor: Lift up your hearts.

COMMUNION OF THE PEOPLE

If you are worshiping via live stream, place a plate with bread or crackers and a cup with juice, wine, water, or other common beverage in your home worship space.

Wherever you are, you are invited to partake of the bread and the cup.

If you are worshiping in person, please come down the center aisle to receive the communion elements. You can choose intinction (dipping the bread into the cup) from the servers nearest the center aisle or bread and individual cups from the servers nearest the outside aisles; partake and return to your seat using the side aisles. All communion bread is gluten free. Ushers will bring communion to the seats of those who cannot come forward.

PRAYER AFTER COMMUNION

Pastor: O Lord, our God, we rise from this table knowing a love beyond our deserving. Thank you for giving us a place at your table; for serving us the bread of life; for offering to us, even to us, the cup of salvation. In humility and hope, we go now from this night to your promised day. In Christ we pray.

THE MEANING OF THE MAUNDY THURSDAY SERVICE

On this Holy Thursday we remember the final meal Jesus shared with his disciples on the last night of his life as he was in Jerusalem for the Passover festival.

The word "Maundy" is derived from the Latin word for "mandate" and refers to the scripture in John 13 where Jesus says to his disciples (including us), "A new commandment (mandate) I give to you, that you love one another."

The Lord's Supper has special significance as it commemorates the last meal Jesus shared with his disciples until he ate with them in the Kingdom of God (Luke 22:16). Bread was and is a common staple of life which Jesus used as a symbol for his body, broken into pieces to demonstrate the giving of himself for others.

Wine was another common staple of life in the first century and its consumption was part of everyday life. When Jesus shares the cup, it is a symbol of his blood shed and the sacrifice of his life for all humanity.

The sharing of this very common meal was and is a way of enjoying an ongoing relationship with Jesus Christ, "For as often as you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes." (1 Corinthians 11:26)
