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From Pastor Keith L. DeVries:

"Reflections Upon an Extended Stay"

On November 5, Norman Dean Shaver, Jenny's dad, entered the Church Triumphant at the age of 98. As many of you know, Dean/Dad has been living with us for the past four years. When he first

arrived, he was somewhat independent, but within twelve months it became clear that he required more assistance. So, we invited a parade of caregivers, VA doctors and nurses, physical and occupational therapists, and other health care professionals associated with the VA healthcare system into our home and lives to partner with us in Dad's care. We are truly thankful!

Dad was easy to have around 24/7 these past four years and he seldom complained, but his living with us did change how we navigated our lives both professionally and personally as every decision we made took Dad's situation into account as well. Jenny and I became partners and tag team caregivers, ad-

justing our schedules at work and at home so one of us or a caregiver was always present with dad. Through it all, dad was an easy roommate to have around, as he mostly enjoyed our menu choices, as

long as we kept to his set routine: instant oatmeal with blueberries or strawberries, two eggs scrambled hard, coffee and juice for breakfast; and clam chowder or soup and juice for lunch. Dinner was whatever we were having and always included ice cream. One of my favorite times of each day was helping Dad get ready for bed. He

would always say to us as part of his nightly ritual, "Sweet dreams," and of course we would say the same to him. Thank you, Dad, for your service as a WWII veteran, for your hard work

and dedication to your family, and for being a good housemate these past four years. We are grateful for the opportunity to provide a home that you could call your own in the twilight years of your life. We love you, Dad, and know that you are now resting in the loving embrace of our Lord.

As we enter the seasons of Advent and Christmas, we once again do so preparing for and celebrating the gift of God's coming, the gift of God's love incarnate, born in a manger. And even though our family celebrates these sea-

sons without dad's physical presence, we gratefully and joyfully bear witness to the good news of resurrection and Christ's coming again.

munity during that first ever capital campaign. By 1927 a 28-foot by 50-foot church was built at 5645 Marconi Ave on

Presbyterian Church.

This November the church held its annual steward-ship cam-

paign. As we look into the new year, we anticipate a capital campaign raising funds to completely renovate the parking lot, including solar panels that will supply close to 65% of our energy needs. The function of the annual stewardship process is to sustain the church's operating budget for the following fiscal year. Stewardship is an ongoing life process in the church. This differs from a capital campaign which asks members and other donors to make a commitment of sacrificial giving over a specific time period, with the results generally being capital improvements.

Over the last thirty years, CPC has held six capital campaigns. This equates to over eight million dollars that helped transform and update

our campus. These improvements include the DeVries Gathering Place, McMillen Hall, the Food Closet, the Columbarium, a commercial kitchen, a new music center, new administrative offices, a new organ, a new piano and choir seating, the Library, closed circuit tv, remodeled restrooms with showers, and the list goes on and on. Just as our annual stewardship commitment relies on members to help keep the annual budget going, the care and sustainability of our campus faithfully puts its trust again in its members and in the capital campaign process.

As we move into 2025 you will hear more information on how funding works, details and history of how the parking lot project has developed,

including an anticipated construction timeline. You might even be asked to volunteer vour time and talents for the campaign team. Just as those ninety members in 1923 imagined the possibilities for ministry in their own church building, we con-

tinue to imagine our future ministry and devotedly move forward paving the way to welcome all.

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Pastor Ivan N. Herman Writes:

"The Scandalous Particularity of Incarnation"

What would be good news for you today?

Christmas is the celebration of the incarnation of God in Jesus of Nazareth, a very particular person in a particular time and place. The Incarnation is unique to Christiani-

ty in that this person is not half-God and half-human, but fully God and fully human. It is scandalous to believe the Creator of all that has been, is, and ever will can be poured completely into this one man. If we want to know who God is, we look to

the example of Jesus, not because Jesus is like God, but that God is like Jesus.

Richard Rohr, in his 2014 book *Eager to Love: The Alternative Way of Francis of Assisi* says, "Theologians call the principle of concrete-to-universal knowing 'the scandal of particularity.' John Duns Scotus asserted that God only created particulars and individuals, a quality he named "thisness" (haecceity).

Thisness grounds the principle of incarnation in the concrete and the specific. You can't really love universals. It's hard to love concepts, forces, or ideas."

And it is hard to feel love from the idea of God. Jesus is

"Jesus is how the love of God is revealed to us. God loves you, each of you, every one of you, and all of you."

how the love of God is revealed to us. God loves you, each of you, every one of you, and all of you.

That scandalous particularity also means that the good news of Jesus isn't just good news for whole of creation, but that it is good news for you in your life today. Jesus didn't say he came to be our conductor who punches our ticket to heaven;

he said he came to proclaim good news to the poor, freedom for the prisoners, recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, and proclaim the year of jubilee. That means the incarnation of Jesus is good news for us in the

problems and challenges of our real, every-day lives.

Rachel Held Evans in her book Inspired: Slaying Giants, Walking on Water, and Loving the Bible Again reminds us that "Jesus invites us into a story that is bigger than ourselves, bigger than our culture, bigger even than our imaginations, and yet we get to tell that story with the scandalous particularity of our particular moment and place in time. We are storytelling creatures because we are fashioned in the im-

age of a storytelling God."

I hope this year that you hear the Christmas story not

hear the Christmas story not just as something that happened 2000 years ago, but as a story of God's love born in you. That is good news, indeed!

O holy Child of Bethlehem, descend to us, we pray;

cast out our sin and enter in; be born in us today.



God is Our Refuge in Times of Change


"God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble."

-Psalm 46:1

December-January..... a time of new birth. In December, of course, we celebrate the birth of our Savior Jesus Christ with the new covenant, life everlasting that this brings us. And January is the beginning of the New Year— another opportunity for new activities, growth, and relationships.

As we journey through life, we pass through many seasons and many changes. This season may be one that is joyful and celebratory for you, or it may be difficult because of the loss of a loved one, worries about income, experiencing difficult family relationships, caring for loved ones who are experiencing declining health, or experiencing health problems ourselves. Changes in our circumstances or expectations may cause us severe stress, feelings of isolation, and/or anxiety, which the holiday season may exacerbate.

However, you are not alone! Stephen Ministry is one way our church reaches out to people who are hurting. Stephen Ministers are trained to offer distinctively Christian care as people learn to cope with the stresses and changes that are happening in their lives.



Dinah Miria Mulock Craik (1866) wrote, "Oh, the comfort --the inexpressible comfort of feeling safe with a person--having neither to weigh thoughts nor measure words, but pouring them all right out, just as they are, chaff and grain together; certain that a faithful hand will take and sift them, keep what is worth keeping, and then with the breath of kindness, blow the rest away. . ."

Stephen Ministers have been trained to listen in just such a way as Ms. Craik describes. They provide confidential, nonjudgmental, and high-quality Christian care, empathy, support, encouragement, and a sounding-board when needed, to individuals experiencing a crisis or challenge. When a Stephen Minister meets one-to-one with his or her care receiver, Jesus is present, bringing the power of his transforming love, and the peace, healing, and comfort that only God can give. Ste-

phen Ministers help us remember that God promises to always love us, no matter what! In the midst of life's struggles, God's love car-

ries us. Even though we don't know what will happen tomorrow, we can know that God will be with us and God's love for us will remain unchanged, lasting forever.

PW Bible Study Continues

Author Patricia K. Tull has provided us with much to ponder in this year's Bible study, Let Justice Roll Down:

God's Call to Care for Neighbors and All Creation. In Lessons 1, 2, and 3 we have reflected on Environmental Justice, Land Justice, and Food Justice. In December we will study Lesson 4: "Water Justice" and in January our Lesson 5 will be "Air Quality." What does Scripture teach and Lesson 5 explores

us about these pre-

cious resources? In Lesson 4 we will reflect on how water's sacred standing has been highlighted among humans since ancient times. The books of Genesis and Exodus repeatedly exemplify both the desirability and the dangers of water. Today the fight for clean, abundant water has become fiercer as water is taken for granted and treated like a commodity by some, and as climate change has intensified both drought and flooding worldwide.

In January we will turn to Lesson 5: "Air Quality." From the outset of Scripture's story of life, air has been associated with God, who breathes life

into every human and animal. It is, therefore, critical that we examine how pollution of the air we breathe particularly

endangers the world's youngest and oldest citizens.

Lesson Four in the PW Horizons Study explores "Water Justice" "Air Ouality."


