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#### From Pastor Keith L. DeVries:

## "Imagining God's Future in Our Community"

I know it is sometimes hard to imagine God's good future when we are surrounded by chaos and crisis daily. There is war in the Middle East, Ukraine, and Sudan, among others; politics and politicians are at their worst as we approach a national election; gun violence is the

new normal; natural disasters devastate people's lives; personal loss and grief can be paralyzing; and the church— our church— seems to be in constant change. We yearn for days gone by. But imagining God's future is not about looking through the nostalgic lens of yesterday, it is about being open to God's transformative possibil-

ities today and tomorrow.

• Five years ago, I don't think I could have imagined what our worship service would look like, but along came a pandemic and God's people at CPC were forced to think differently about worship and music, resulting in our embracing live streaming, a blended style of worship on Sunday mornings and the additions of gifted new musicians who joined our staff.

• Five years ago, I don't think I could have imagined CPC embracing our calling to welcome all, focusing on becoming a safe space for members of the LGBTQIA+ community, but today it has become a priority for our Inclusion Task Force and our minis-

- Five years ago, I don't think I could have imagined the transformation of our Food Closet ministry after 50+ years, but as leadership met the challenge of being flexible while introducing new ways of serving food to those in greatest need in our community.
- Five years ago, I would not, could not, have imagined that financially we would be able to sustain current levels of mission

and ministry while worship attendance decreases, our demographic ages, and how people "do church," changes, but we are still here "being church" in Carmichael.

The constants throughout these past five years, and in fact, for the past 100+ years,

have been the blessings of God's Holy Spirit that blows mightily in our midst, and your amazing generosity and faithful stewardship. During worship on November 24, we will dedicate our financial pledges which support current staffing levels, and CPC's mission, ministry and programs for

The Transgender Day of Remembrance memorializes those lives lost due to actual or perceived gender identity and expression. The first memorial was a candlelight vigil in Boston in November 1999 to Rita Hester, murdered in 1998.

Since then, annual memorials on this day have been observed around the world. This vigil will be dedicated to the memories of Carina Holleran, Carol Byers and Ruby Molina among many others who have fallen to ignorance and intolerance.

#### **Nevertheless**


Nevertheless is a wonderful word! For example: The holidays are coming and you feel lonely, nevertheless God sends people into your life to lift you up. You are worried

and afraid, nevertheless you trust that God is with you. You feel harried and pushed for time, nevertheless when you make time for prayer, you feel God's love and peace surround you. Your world

is falling apart, nevertheless some good things are happening. Take a minute and reflect --what is your nevertheless?

Actively looking for each nevertheless, takes practice. Much like actively being aware of blessings in your life; being grateful—takes practice. Both these activities bring faith to life. Unfortunately, the storms of life, like the uncertainties and difficulties we are experiencing with the divisiveness surrounding us and the catastrophic effects of climate change, have a way of distracting us from the Divine Presence that is always accessible to us. When we look to our own strengths and abilities to solve our problems, we

become afraid. *Nevertheless* we can learn to count on God. Macrina Wiederkehr, in her book *Abide*, says that we each "must learn to listen for the voice that awakens me to the



"Awakening to the One," can take many forms. Memorizing scripture is always helpful! For ex-

ample: Joshua 1:5, "I will be with you; I will never leave you nor forsake you;" 2 Timothy 1:7, "For God did not give us a spirit of timidity, but a spirit of power, of love, and of self-discipline;" and Isaiah 43:5, "Fear not, for I am with you." Holding on to verses like these gives us the strength to trust God and to walk through our fears with courage.

Another way we may be helped through life's difficulties may be by asking for a Stephen Minister. Many in our congregation and community are facing grief, terminal illness, divorce, loss of a job, an empty nest, chronic illness, and many other challenges. We know that God can always

bring forth good out of every calamity. Yet when our life is turned upside down by any kind of disaster, it may be hard to remember and believe that. Stephen Ministers are there to walk with you through your crisis and to help you see that nevertheless with God's love, you will be okay.

Although our pastors may find there are more needs for long term care than they can easily provide, the good news is, Stephen Ministers are trained to supplement, not replace, pastoral care. When someone requests a Stephen Minister, the Stephen Minister meets with that person for about an hour each week. Stephen Ministers provide confidentiality, listen nonjudgmentally, offer a sounding board, and the special encouragement, care, and Christ-centered support for as long as it is needed.

## Solar for CPC: Progress Report

At the Congregational meeting on August 18 approval was granted for a loan from the Synod of

Northern California which will allow CPC to install a Solar Electric system. A few weeks later (and after nearly three years of meetings, research, and planning) Tim Farley,

Chair of our

Buildings and Grounds Division, and John Salmon from Premo Roofing and Solar signed the contract that will allow us to begin the installation process. We are hopeful that the system will be operational by the end of

this year or early next year. Premo has already begun the engineering analysis for the project. The solar panels will be installed in the parking lot

> and are projected to cover about 65% of our monthly electricity costs.

In the early months of 2025 we will begin a capital campaign to raise funds for the Solar System and the renovation of the Parking Lot. Each of us will then have an opportunity to fi-

nancially support these important additions to our campus to keep us strong for the next 100 years. We will keep you posted as progress continues on the solar and parking lot projects.

## **Mission Update**

The Carmichael Food Closet wants to thank all of you who participated in donating peanut butter in August and soup in Souptember. These are both items that are often hard for us to get from the Food Bank and grocery stores who support our distribution.

We did not have a donation item for October because we are now participating in Kids Can. Food Closet volunteers delivered flyers, posters and empty cardboard boxes to 18 elementary, middle and high schools in our area. During October students brought non-perishable food items to school and put them in the boxes. In early November, the same volunteers will return to the schools and pick up the boxes. In the past, we have collected as many as 14,000 pounds of goods. That's 7 tons!

For the rest of this year we ask you to continue to save cardboard egg cartons and grocery bags to donate to the Food Closet. Some people have even purchased extra paper grocery bags and donated those to us. We use 120 to 150 grocery bags a day to serve those who come to us for nourishing food.

The Food Closet continues

to need volunteers. Please consider donating at least two hours a month to supporting this work that Carmichael Presbyterian has supported


## Presbyterian Women Study Continues

The Presbyterian Women Bible Study for 2024-2025: Let Justice Roll Down: God's Call to Care for Neighbors and All

Creation continues in November with Lesson Three: Food Justice.

Scripture: Genesis 1:22, 3:19; Exodus 16:13-18, 19-21; Joshua 5:12; Psalms 65:11-14, 78:23-29, 105:40-41; Hosea 4:1b-3; Micah 6:12-15; Mathew 13:8; Mark 4:8; Luke 8:



Lesson Three in the PW Horizons Study explores "Food Justice."

The main idea of this lesson is that he Bible portrays the earth as yielding food in abundance, and today's agricultural scientists say it could provide food for all. We can learn to produce food with justice and peace and feed a starving world.

Scripture tells us that the earth yields food in abundance and the tragedy of starvation is needless. We will learn that throughout history greed, slavery, serfdom, industrial farming practice and inequitable food distribution have led to a more impoverished world. Hosea puts it this way, "The land mourns... even the fish of the sea are perishing." We will discuss

examples of this tragedy and how we can reverse it starting with Scripture.
