Most of the Parking Lot Task Force (PLTF) meetings begin with three questions –





3. Turning Over Tables, A Lenten Call For Disrupting Power, by Kathy Escobar. Available in the church office for \$12. This will be the basis for a Lenten study, led by Pastor Ivan and me beginning March 2, in the Howard Crowley Room following worship. See Pastor Ivan's article on page 4 for more details.

In preparing for my Lenten journey, I share with you a few sentences from each devotional to give you a sense of

what each one brings to the table.

From "Grieving Change and Loss:"

The wilderness of Lent, this 40-day journey with Jesus, is a journey of grief. We prepare ourselves to lose Jesus on the cross. We boldly lean into the pain of this loss to remind us of our love for Christ and of God's love for us. But the hope of Christ's death rests in the new life it offers. Resurrection is the gift that reminds us that death is not the end. that we journey toward healing and hope.

As stark as the reminder is, we welcome the gift of this Ash Wednesday. It's the perfect beginning to Lent, this reminder that we don't have forever, that we are mortal, that we and those we love will die. It's the perfect prompt to return us to God, to Godly living, to cherishing life as a precious, fragile gift.

From *Where the Eye* Alights:

Lent is a time of permission. Many of us find it hard to give ourselves permission to pause, to sit still, to reflect or meditate or pray in the midst of daily occupations—

most of them very likely worthy in themselves—that fill our waking minds and propel us out of bed and on to the next thing. We need the explicit invitation the liturgical year provides to change pace, to curtail our busyness a bit, to make our times with self and God a little more spacious, a little more leisurely, and see what comes. The reflections I offer

here come from a very simple practice of daily meditation on whatever has come to mind in the quiet of early morning.

From Turning Over Tables:

To me, the season of Lent, on the road to Easter, is always about intentionally opening ourselves up to what's underneath the surface, what's hidden in the dark, what tectonic plates

need to shift for something new to be born. It is also supposed to disrupt us and lead us to action.

Days like Ash Wednesday, where we are confronted with our humanity, our mortality, can help equalize and ground us in a deeper truth. It helps remind us that we came from dust and we'll return to it. It can help us be more honest, humble, vulnerable, and rightsized, and these are the essential ingredients that are needed in conversations about power.

Dusty ones, this Ash Wednesday, let's humbly rightsize ourselves—not too big, not too small.

Friends, pick out a devotional or two or three from the stack on your kitchen table and join with me on this Lenten journey of discovery.

system will be constructed
first. We currently expect it to
be installed this spring. It
should take about three
weeks.

We hope that "breaking ground" for the whole parking lot will happen in late summer or early fall. We still need final approval from the County, a request for construction bids needs to be finalized and advertised, bids need to be received and evaluated. Also, a proposed contract needs to be reviewed by legal professionals.

The construction of the parking lot will probably take about 60 days. There are many parts to the project, such as demolition, grading, lighting, irrigation and land-

scaping, that have to take place before paving begins.

As Karen Orlando said last month in her excellent article on "Paving The Way To Welcome All," you will be hearing more from the PLTF. We are revising the rendering display of the parking lot and we will be sharing that and more details in future Q & A meetings.

As we continue to work on the construction details, we're beginning to brainstorm solutions to other questions like where will worshippers, other visitors, and staff park during construction? And how can the Food Closet function during that time?

Stand by! We're getting close.

Changes to Communion Service

The Worship Division will be implementing changes to how we serve Communion in order to better adhere to recommendations in CPC's Earth Care Congregation recertification. We are seeking to reduce waste and to make the Lord's Supper accessible to everyone.

To this end, beginning on Ash Wednesday, March 5, Communion will include only gluten-free bread and will be served by intinction (dipping the bread into a common cup). This will enable us to serve intinction style without fear of contaminating the juice with wheat and will feel more inclusive for all. We have hosted literacy education, job fairs, sports programs, and provided financial support to benefit hundreds of refugees who have become new Sacramento residents. IMPORTANT WORLD RELIEF SACRAMENTO UPDATE SUSPENSION OF REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT

On inauguration day, the new presidential administration issued an executive order that suspended the U.S. Refugee Resettlement Program. This action closes the door for refugees who are desperately seeking a safe place to rebuild their lives. Refugees who had waited months or years, navigated intense vetting, and had flights scheduled to arrive in the US, immediately began to see those flights cancelled. No new refugees are entering the US. Then, late on Friday, January 24, World Relief was notified by the U.S. Department of State that all federally funded activities providing initial resettlement support to the refugees we most recently welcomed to the U.S., must stop effective immediately. This federal government funding has historically provided the most basic 90-day assistance to cover food, shelter, clothing and transportation, allowing for World Relief, our volunteers and church partners to focus on wrap-around services, biblical welcome and care for our newest neighbors. We were counting on this financial backing to complete all the required and needed services for those who are already here.

WHAT THIS MEANS AND HOW YOU CAN HELP

Emergency Aid: First and foremost, the immediate cut to funding means that World Relief no longer has the funds needed to pay for case management staffing or to provide the most basic human needs to recently arrived families, such as housing, food, and transportation. Even with the news on January 29 that some restrictions on federal funding have been lifted, the order to stop work and support for newly arrived refugees is still in place. These are some of our most vulnerable neighbors. These actions by our government have created a true emergency for these newest arrivals in our community. The urgency of this moment cannot be overstated.

World Relief Sacramento is now facing a funding gap of upwards of \$1 million to continue providing essential support. We cannot bridge this gap without your help.

Overcoming Storms

"Surely God is my salvation; I will trust and not be afraid."

-Isaiah 12:2

This verse brings to my mind the image of a storm rag-

ing all around me.
Lightning flashing,
thunder booming, and
rain lashing the windows. The good news
is, I am safe inside,
warm, and protected
from the furor going
on outside. This is the
comfort and reassurance that faith gives
me despite the anxie-

ty and fear I may experience on occasion. There are big, uncontrollable things in the world, things that can and do bring fear: violence, hate crimes, climate change resulting in disasters, etc. These are fears that we may find difficult (impossible) to brush aside. This also was the case in the times that Isaiah prophesied to an anxious people wondering what the future would hold. For eons, people have called out to God when they suffered through floods and fires, through food shortages, life-threatening illness, and every form of tyranny and terror.

We can overcome our fears with trust in God and faith in the salvation promised to us by remembering that we are not alone; God's presence is promised throughout scripture. Nadia Bolz-Weber reminds us: "From where does



our help come? Not from our cell phones, I'll tell you that. Our help comes from the Lord of power and might, who never tires of hearing our prayers, never tires of being our help in times of trouble and never tires of offering us comfort and relief. God has been our help throughout human history."

And, we are blessed that we know we have Jesus walking with us. Strengthened by this, we can bring Jesus' light, his peace into our own lives and the world. Going to someone we trust for support, finding ways to meditate and regulate our body, and remembering other times that we got through fear can be a time of faith building. Hopefully, we

will ultimately come to realize that in many ways, our faith has been shaped through fear and that we are stronger and more resilient through it all.

As you confront your fears or other difficult challenges in your life, finding someone to talk to, to support you can be life changing. You may be experiencing difficulties like chronic illness, care giving a loved one, grief, uncertainty of income, or any number of other fear-inducing situations. CPC offers specially trained Stephen Ministers to walk with you through the storms of life. A Stephen Minister meets confidentially each week with their care receiver, one-to-one, for as long as is needed. A Stephen Minister listens without judgement, is a sounding board as needed, offers prayer, encouragement, and affirmation as you move from a place of fear or "stuckness" to resilience and peace.

In March, the Presbyterian Women Bible study, *Let Justice Roll Down*, continues with

Lesson Seven, Economic Climate Justice. Author Rev. Dr. Patricia K. Tull's scripture focus is Deuteronomy 15:7-11, Matthew 26:11, Mark 14:7, and John 12:8. The Bible's economic wisdom never promises to eradicate poverty: "You always have the poor with you." BUT we can reduce suffering and strengthen the entire social network. Previous chapters of this study have examined primarily environmental issues resulting from human behavior. Lesson 7 will encourage us to consider our economic climate justice. As people of faith we are called to provide dignity and opportunity to all. Further, God's intention is that no one be in need within the community and, if there is need, that people give generously in order to care for their neighbor.

News from CPC's Marinerships

Companionship

Companionship Mariners met on a cold rainy afternoon, February 1. We enjoyed an interesting and amazing talk by **Bep van der Mik** about

growing up in Holland and her experiences during World War II. She told us that the weather in Holland is often cold and rainy, with a brisk

breeze. Her experience walking in that

kind of weather has helped keep Bep in good health for 90 years. Bep was born in Zwolle, a town in the middle of Holland which features a famous church built in the 1400s. The family owned a bakery and lived upstairs over the business, which was about a block long. The bakery was a favorite place for coffee and pastries on Sunday mornings.

Bep, the youngest of seven children, was 5 years old when a cousin came to their home crying to say that the war had started with the bombing of Rotterdam. Bep and other children in the neighborhood distributed Underground Resistance pamphlets. One of her brothers was involved in the Underground Resistance. He trans-

ported weapons and helped the Allies in other ways. He was picked up by the Germans and spent time in concentration camps in Holland and Hamburg, Germany,

where he was able to

escape. Another
brother joined the
Allies. Bep's
family was
forced to have a
German officer
living with them.
For security reasons, he was required to knock to gain

admittance - he was not given a key! Like many families, they had a radio well-hidden in a linen closet tuned to Radio Netherlands to hear information about the war. They had Jewish neighbors across the street who owned a fish market. Bep remembers that this family disappeared and never returned. While many in Zwolle suffered from hunger and resorted to eating tulip bulbs, Bep's family was not hungry because of their bakery business. While the schools were closed, families got together to help teach the children, but their education was lacking. They found out the war was over when Canadians arrived to liberate the country. Later, Bep and her husband Simon arrived in the United States in 1957. They

lived in Boston and Texas before finally coming to California. She has been attending Carmichael Presbyterian Church for about 50 years!

After Bep's talk we enjoyed a delicious Valentine's Day cake and festive decorations set up by Karen and Bud Banker and Sharlene St. Clair. Co-Skipper Marti Wallace called our meeting to order and gave a health update on Dave Beeby. He seems to be improving a bit. The Beebys have a new caregiver who has been much more consistent. Sharlene St Clair had been in the hospital with cellulitis. Barbara Farley distributed the 2025 Companionship roster and program. Thanks for creating this for us. Barbara!

Elayne Anderson asked for ideas for our April movie discussion. Contenders included Conclave and American Fiction. We decided to do the Soup of the Month again for the Planting Seeds of Faith auction on March 30. It was suggested that this year the men take on the soup-making responsibility. 
