Pastor Ivan N. Herman Writes:

"Reframing Beauty"

Plans for Summer Sabbatical

It is with gratitude that I embrace the opportunity for sabbatical leave from June 1-August 31, 2025. Carmichael

Presbyterian Church provides a compensated sabbatical/renewal leave for its ministers and educators after every six years of service. Having been in this call since 2009, I was previously granted a threemonth sabbatical in 2016. Though I was offered the opportunity for sabbatical leave in 2023 and 2024, I have chosen to defer it until 2025.

According to our CPC policy, "a sabbatical/renewal leave will enable

the minister/educator to be renewed by extended rest and time with family. The sabbatical/renewal leave may provide time for continuing education and fresh mentoring by respected teachers, but the primary purpose is to re-establish healthy rhythms so that the minister can return to the responsibilities of the church

with new energy, spiritual vision and effectiveness."

My sabbatical theme is "Reframing Beauty." I plan to



PW Bible Study Concludes



The 2024-2025 PW Bible Study, Let Justice Rolls Down, concludes with Lesson 9, Sustaining Creation's Health for All. Throughout this study, author Rev. Dr. Patricia Hull has taken us on an interesting journey as we explored God's call to care for neighbors and all creation. Discussions have been spirited, enlightening, respectful, and always focused on action. The main idea behind Les-

and lead us to seek just ways to care for the earth and one another.

One of the Scriptures this lesson focuses on in this lesson is Psalm 104 which celebrates all that God has created in the interwoven tapestry of life. Interwoven is the key phrase as the psalm highlights the ways some elements of creation sustain others. Interwoven, interconnected, and interdependent. Journalist for the Presbyterian Outlook magazine, Rosalind Banbury, shares these observations: "It is not easy for us to believe that God reigns when in chaos, inhumanity, cruelty, and deep division in our country

and world fill the news. It is also difficult to envision the Lord's reign when we view existence in fragmented ways

through our roles as scientists, developers, businesspeople, medical helpers, teachers or parents. We see God through our own narrow viewpoint. When we remember that we are one creature among many and that every living thing is connected, we can gain a perspective that can help all things live in balance." The closing prayer for Lesson 9 is, "God who creates and recreates, renew our vision and invigorate our souls, that we may both see and seek the world you desire for

all. Help us translate hope into daily actions in the corner of the earth that we call home. Amen." May it be so.

■ I've Been Thinking... by Maria Shriver (242) There are numerous prayers and meditations, many of which begin with "The Power of ..." Our library has some of her children's books as well

 Pious and Secular America by Reinhold Niebuhr (277.3) Although written in 1958, this collection of essays is valuable in reflecting the times. It covers what was happening in the 50s politically and socially. The author was a professor at Union Theological Seminary and a national figure from the 30s to the 70s as a theologian and a commentator on politics. As a footnote, Niebuhr is the author of the serenity prayer.

New York Times bestselling author

MARIA SHRIVER

 Almost Everything by Anne Lamott (814) Fans of Lamott will welcome another addition to our collection. An example of her writing: "I am SECULAR AMERICA stockpiling antibiotics for the apocalypse even as I await the blossoming of paperwhites on the windowsill." The subtitle of the book

> Under the Overpass by Mike Yankoski (301.44) Even though this book was written 20 years ago by a Christian college student, it is still relevant today. It is a first per-

son account of what it is like to be homeless. Luckily, Mike could come home after five months living in six cities. Today there are many more still on the streets. Mike challenges us in his call to action.

■ *The Last Week* by Marcus

Marcus J. Borg &

John Dominic Crossan

Borg and John Dominic Crossan (232.96) The book is all vou've ever wanted to know about Holy Week. It is a very detailed reading of Mark's Gospel, and an easy-to-read


exegesis (a phrase which is usually an oxymoron). Borg gives background on the Roman Empire, and in the first chapter points out that there were two entries into Jerusalem on Palm Sun-

day.

John Dominic Crossan

■ *God and Empire* by John Dominic Crossan (225.9) Along the same lines, this book's subtitle is: Jesus against Rome, then and now. According to his epilogue, Crossan has attempted to answer the question, "How is it possible to be a faithful Christian in an American Empire facilitated by a violent Christian Bible?" This makes for provocative reading.

The Light of Hope

[Jesus] said, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of hope." (John 8:12)

Many people are feeling the mental and emotional exhaustion stemming from the stress and challenges presented in these uncertain times. Many are feeling like this is a dark tunnel with barely any light at the end being revealed. As humans, we tend to focus on our problems, keeping our heads down, plodding along wearily, yet not asking for help. It may be challenging to remember that the light, the help, and the hope that God offers is always here for us!

Although I struggle to understand the book of Job—talk about someone experiencing overwhelming hardships! this story offers insight into how perseverance can overcome disaster. Despite everything, through faith, Job was able to hold on to hope, even in the very midst of his trying times, and say, "I know that my redeemer lives and that in the end he will stand on the earth." (Job 19:25) Job didn't say this after his struggle was over-he was able to say this before God restored his life! Job had persistence and hope to imagine that while there

would still be hard days ahead, evidence of God's work of redemption was there. This is the essence of the "Easter story" we experi-

enced anew just a couple weeks ago.

Perhaps you are one of those who are feeling worn down by challenging times, need care, are

feeling overwhelmed, or you know someone else who is having difficulty. As you may know, Stephen Ministers share God's love, providing one-to-one care, compassion, prayer, community, and a listening ear. The care they provide is highly confidential, and the lay members who serve as caregivers, called Stephen Ministers, have had 50+ hours of training to provide that care.

Job loss, death of a loved one, divorce, and chronic or life-threatening illness are common reasons to receive care from a Stephen Minister. As human beings, we are meant to live in community, yet sometimes, broken relationships or divisions within our community have driven a wedge between families and

friends and we hesitate to ask for help. Sometimes, having a safe person who isn't a friend or spouse to talk with confidentially, offers a place for in-

> dividuals to share the difficulties or pain they're carrying. Individuals can meet with their Stephen Minister each week for about an hour, in person or by phone. Stephen Ministers have a

true gift for listening and praying, and they ask for nothing in return. They are ready to serve you; it's a free gift!

Many of us at various times may have difficulty feeling God's presence and hope in the midst of difficult times.
