

Each year, when these young people reach the age when they must leave foster care, social workers endeavor to find housing for them. Part of this transition is the gift of a lap robe to take with them.

In May each year the circle ladies fold, tie, box and deliver these lap robes to the social services offices to be distribpense. P W. would welcome any donations to help with that.

Even though our ladies never meet these lap robe recipients, we are told these gifts are received with thanks and some tears. Some have said that is the first new gift they have ever received.

This lap robe ministry has enriched the lives of the Dorcas ladies along with the foster youth.

Food Closet News

On Monday May 13, **John Busath** began serving as the new Food Closet Warehouse Manager. John and his wife, **Michelle**, have been coordinating the Carmichael HART

shower program on Saturdays for the past two years. During that time John became interested in the work of the Food Closet. He volunteered as a driver and when he heard

that our last warehouse manager had left, he asked to be considered for the warehouse position. His offer has been accepted, and we look forward to working with him in the future.

A year ago, we stopped having people call in to register for food distribution. During the phone in era, we accepted the first 25 people who called. During this interim time, we have served every family who arrives before 2:00 p.m. This has increased our service to as many 60 families averaging about 45 each day.

On June 1 we will be transitioning from the paper registration of our guests who

come to receive food to a computerized system with the Sacramento Food Bank called Oasis. Ten of us received training in April and May. When we begin using Oasis on



June 2 people from the Food Bank will be with us for a few days to help with a smooth transition. With this new program all our data will go

directly to Food Bank so we will no longer have to enter and report the data via our antiquated Access system. Thanks to all – Kathy Phillips, **Barbara Farley, Lynette** Ledesma, Helen Magnuson, and Monique Schubert - who have faithfully done the record keeping and reporting under our old system. One of the advantages of Oasis is that it is the system used by all the food closets that distribute TEFAP so we will be aware of how the food distribution is used by people in Sacramento County.

As summer approaches we will be exploring ways to address how we serve those who walk up for food distribution. As many as 30 families walk to the Food Closet from the surrounding apartments and often have to stand and wait to be served.

The Food Closet received a grant from Abound Food Care for \$16,000. The focus of the grant is to keep as much waste as possible out of the organic waste container and improve the safety and quality of our food distribution. We are purchasing some new equipment: a stand-alone freezer, and materials and supplies to improve the safety of our distribution.






