
If you missed this year's church family campout at Scotts


Everyone is so friendly and happy to be helping in one way or another. I've always wished that grocery stores would donate food to a worthy cause before it spoiled and here it was hap-



Opiate Overdose Prevention Program

Between October and June, I attended training on behalf of CPC to learn about the biological process of addiction, the role of opiates, how to reduce harm from opiates, addiction treatment, and recovery with the goal of reducing opiate overdose deaths. This ecumenical effort was supported by The Clinton Foundation in collaboration with the California Department of Health Services

and Sacramento County Substance Abuse Services. Representatives from Christian,
Jewish, Muslim, Buddhist,
and Religious Science denominations met monthly
to share our faith's history of, and openness
to discussing addiction
and overdose prevention. This was the 13th year
the Clinton Foundation has
sponsored these trainings and
the first one in Sacramento.

I'm now part of a countywide network of faith leaders tasked to increase our church members' understanding of addiction, reduce stigma (e.g., addiction is not a moral failing), address concerns, find treatment resources, and celebrate recovery. Ultimately, we are focused on preventing deaths from opiate overuse by providing harm reduction materials: fentanyl test strips (to determine whether drugs purchased on the street are laced with fentanyl), and Narcan (a nose spray that rapidly stops (Continued on page 10)

Participants developed plans for sharing what they'd learned about addiction and recovery and in return received \$2,000 grants. I worked with Rev. Jason Bense, Lutheran Church of the Redeemer; and Rabbi Nancy Wechsler, Congregation Beth Shalom to sponsor a Recovery Market on Sunday, May 18, at Congregation Beth Shalom. Recovery Markets provide an opportunity for artisans in recovery to reestablish connections to sell their artistic creations. Markets have a very upbeat atmosphere as friends reconnect and share their successes in recovery. Items for sale include BBQ spices, woodworked items, crocheted items, tie-dyed clothing, and jewelry.

CPC will host the next Recovery Market on Saturday, August 30, from 10:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m. The main Market will be in McMillen Hall. Classes or meetings will be held in classrooms or the parlor. It's a family friendly event that I hope will attract many people in the CPC community.
