

From Pastor Keith Summer Road Trip

It seems so long ago now, but in July, **Jenny** and I, along with our daughter, **Kaylan**, and her partner, **Drew**, took a road trip of 2,114 miles with precious cargo: our daughter, **Kristel**, and Jenny's dad,

Dean's ashes, to place them at the Pines Cemetery Mausoleum in the Spokane Valley. With many stops along the way, I dubbed this trip the "Family and Friends Tour."

Upon our return, people asked, "How was your vacation? Did you

have fun?" At first, I wasn't quite sure how to respond, but having had a few weeks to ponder our trip, here are my thoughts on the DeVries Family and Friends Tour 2025:

First, Jenny and I love a good road trip! Since I began studying at Whitworth University in 1975 until Jenny's dad came to live with us in 2020, Jenny and I made the trek from Northern California to Spokane several times a year – and it's one of our favorites! On this trip, we reminisced

about past family road trips, enjoyed one of our go-to stops in Bend, Oregon, and admired the postcard views of Eastern Oregon from Highway 97 between Weed and Biggs Junction. It's a little slice of heaven.

Jenny's ancestors came to Enterprise by way of the Oregon Trail and she is related to or knows at least half of the cemetery's residents. It is a stunning location on the way to nowhere, but worth a visit! Other "tour stops" included time with dear friends Don and Barb Fox, who were our travel companions on our trip to France in 2012, a visit with my

cousin, Neil, and his wife, Karen, a stop to see Jenny's Aunt Rose, and a visit with Jenny's cousin, Gail.

This was also an emotional trip. We weren't sure how we would feel as we moved

> through the grieving process. Our intent was to limit this trip to close friends and family. Even though there were many friends we could have visited, we wanted to focus on being together as a family as we said goodbye. The day before we placed Kristel's and Dean's ashes, we got a call from our dear friend,

Denise Williams,

who heard that we were in Spokane. Denise's husband, John, a good friend and colleague, died not long after Kristel. Their daughters, Meghan and Marissa, childhood friends of Kristel and Kaylan, along with Denise, joined us at the cemetery to remember, laugh, cry, and celebrate God's gifts to us named Kristel and Dean. It meant so much to have them with us.

- Click on the "Books" tab to find the full listing of books. In the upper right corner, there is a search bar and books can be searched by title, author, or subject.

Program Year Begins with Fall Gathering

As we do every year, CPC's Presbyterian Women will begin our new PW Bible Study, Finding Resilience, Joy and Our Identity in Jesus

Christ, with a fall gathering on Thursday, September 11 at 10:00 a.m. in the DeVries Gathering Place. Pastor Keith DeVries will introduce the study and guide us through Lesson One. All are invited.

In the nine lessons of the Bible study, we will explore:

- Resilience which is modeled by several Biblical characters, gospel and epistle writers, and the words of Jesus. We will learn that resilience is the ability to spring back into shape in the face of adversity and trauma.
- Christian joy and how to find it in a chaotic world.

 We will learn that for most Christians, joy can occur while we are in the midst of difficult circumstances. Joy is the second fruit of the spirit preceded by love and followed by peace.
- Identity. We will seek to rediscover our identity. We

will learn that identity is more than who we are or who we show ourselves to be. At its core, it points to our humanity.



Lesson One in the 2025-2026 PW Study, Finding Resilience, Joy and Our Identity in Jesus Christ looks at Mary Magdalene, The Tower.

Lesson One: Mary Magdalene, The Tower

Scripture: John 11:17-27

Main Idea: Our faith is strengthened by learning more about Mary Magdalene, a towering witness to the resurrection.

We will learn more about Mary Magdalene, her devotion to Jesus Christ, and her work to spread the gospel. She was there from the start of Jesus' ministry through the resurrection. This is remarkable considering attitudes toward women at that time. We will learn more about Mary Magdalene's difficult history and how Jesus helped her through it. Her story is a model of re-

silience in her ability to bounce back in the face of challenging circumstances. This resilience gave her the courage to follow Jesus throughout his ministry, especially when she was travelling with mostly males.


