

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#### Pastor Ivan Writes:

# **Beguiled by Beauty**

"God is beguiled by beauty into the work of creation by the beauty of the world. Imagining this beauty, our divine Beloved sings it into existence. At the same time, the

beauty of the Good draws humanity and all creation back to its divine source." -Wendy Farley, Beguiled by Beauty

During my sabbatical time this past summer I went on a hunt to capture beauty through the lens of a camera. On a Wednesday in June, I hiked ten miles around Pinnacles National Park. In the cool of the morning, I was the first hiker to reach Bear Gulch Reservoir. The sun was still low enough in the sky that the light wasn't too harsh. A pair of American coots paddled through the otherwise still water that reflected the deep blue of the sky and the bare rock skyline. I took hundreds of photos, seeking to capture just the right angle to show the beauty of this great landscape.

As I continued the hike across the high peaks searching for California condors, I wove through the shadows of the high pinnacles for which the park is named, and ducked into the dark and chilly Balconies Cave, snapping beautiful pictures all the while. When I exited the cave, it seemed that

beauty started to retreat as poison oak stretched onto the dusty trail, and afternoon sun washed all the colors out of the landscape.

Tired and hot, I turned a corner and came face to face with the ugliest tree I've ever seen, dead bark sloughed onto the ground around it. If trees had bodies, it was missing its shoulder and chest, as though someone had attempted bonsai with a shotgun. Twisted as it was, it clung to life and produced a small, leafy cano-

py. Grateful for its shade, I wondered about this tree's story of struggle and tenacity. I realized it was one of the most interesting things I had seen all day, and I saw its true beauty.

Too often we confuse beauty with perfection, prizing form over function and aesthetics over struggle. We look upon that which diverges from the ideal as ugly or marred. Yet the Divine Beloved sees us differently.

You are beautiful, even if still imperfect. God imagined your beauty and has sung you into existence.

Seguiled by your beauty, God continues to sing, shaping and calling you back to your divine source and faithful to complete the good work in you that has already begun.

#### **CPC and Montreat Youth Conferences**

History: The Montreat Conference Center (also known as the Mountain Retreat Association) located in Montreat, North Carolina is a conference center serving the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). The word "Montreat" is a portmanteau of the words "mountain" and "retreat."

- 1897 A group of ecumenical church leaders, led by United Church of Christ minister John Collins, formed the Mountain Retreat Association (MRA). Its purpose was to establish an interdenominational resort and retreat center.
- 1905 J.R. Howerton and the Synod of North Carolina purchased 4,000 acres of the valley to be owned by the Mountain Retreat Association.
- 1907 MRA holds the first Presbyterian conference.
- 1983 The Mountain Retreat Association becomes
  Montreat Conference Center when the United Presbyterian Church in the USA reunites with the Presbyterian Church (US) to become the Presbyterian Church, USA.

Montreat Conference Cen-

ter is one of three national conference centers affiliated with the Presbyterian Church (USA), annually visited by

CPC has a long association with Montreat Conference Center. John Wallace has served as a summer conference small group leader for 28 years.

over 35,000 people seeking physical and spiritual renewal in the beautiful mountains of western North Carolina. For over 100 years, it has been a place set apart for those who journey there seeking a closer relationship with their Creator. During the year, Montreat offers numerous educational opportunities that appeal to different ages and interests: 6 youth conferences, 40 conferences and programs for pastors and committed lay people, 10 weeks of Road Scholar programs, and weekly summer Sunday worship services. In line with its mission statement, the Center promises that those who visit there

"encounter God through relationships, renewal, recreation, and rest."

A Youth Conference
Schedule: Every day of a 6day, manual-driven high
school youth conference includes a keynote address to
begin the day, one or two
small group gatherings to discuss the day's theme, recrea-

tion, and worship to close the day. This format began in 1974 and was adopted by those who organized the first PC (USA) Triennium event at Indiana Uni-

versity in 1980.

CPC's Association: Carmichael Presbyterian Church's association with the Montreat youth conferences has been through John Wallace (a small group leader for 28 years) who was introduced to Montreat by CPC's Rev. Gary Califf in 1996, and Ken DeYoung (a small group leader for 22 years) who was introduced to Montreat by John Wallace in 1997.

# Family Promise & Alternative Gift Market

#### Family Promise and Safe Harbor Step up to Provide More Transitional Housing

Carmichael Presbyterian Church (CPC) supports Family Promise, a nonprofit organization committed to helping

low-income
homeless families
achieve lasting
independence,
and Safe Harbor,
another nonprofit, that is part
of the Family
Promise mix.
Both provide
transitional housing for people on
their way to independence and
stable housing.

In January

2025, Family Promise expanded this effort by leasing a Victorian house from Loaves and Fishes that provides a transitional home for two families. In June 2025, Safe Harbor expanded their efforts by adding another transitional "tiny home" to the three they already run. This house was built by the construction program at Cosumnes River College and funded by Wedbush Securities.

CPC is among several interdenominational congrega-

tions that support and serve Family Promise and Safe Harbor. We provide \$1,600 in grant funding annually, and four times a year serve Safe Harbor in North Sacramento by providing gardening, yard

and kitchen clean up, gift cards, groceries, gift baskets, and household essentials. Our next
