#### Pastor Ivan Writes:

# Standing With Our Ancestors in Faith: The Theological Declaration of Barmen

I was a teenager when I first visited a Presbyterian

church - it was Susan's church in Roanoke, VA. I remember a series of banners hanging in the back of the chapel. They were clearly full of Christian symbols, but I didn't quite understand what each one meant. As I began to grow in familiarity with the Presbyterian tradition, I learned these banners represented each of the creeds and confessions of faith included in the Book of Confessions of the PC (USA). (The set of banners and their history can be found at <a href="https://">https://</a> pcusa.org/

resource/confessional-banners).

Particularly attentiongrabbing was the banner with a swastika with a giant X over it. Who in the world would allow a swastika in their worship space even if it has been crossed out!? Well, Presbyterians, that's who! The ban-

> ner represented the Theological Declaration of Barmen, a statement of faith that emerged when the church in Germany faced pressure to conform to Nazi ideology. This bold statement of faith, written in 1934, was a response to the growing control of the German state over the church that sought to align Christian doctrine with the policies of Adolf Hitler's regime. In this context, a group of theolo-

gians (most no-

tably Karl Barth,

the declaration's primary author) gathered in the city of Barmen to affirm the independence of the church and its sole allegiance to Jesus Christ.

The Barmen Declaration was not simply a protest

against a political movement; it was a clear theological stand against the union of Christianity with the fascist nationalism and militarism that most German Christians embraced. It proclaimed that the church belongs to Christ alone and that no earthly authority can usurp Christ's lordship in the church and in our lives.

Recognizing the lasting significance of Barmen's message, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) included the *Theologi*cal Declaration of Barmen in its Book of Confessions in 1967. This powerful declaration continues to resonate today, reminding us that the church must never compromise its witness to the gospel in the face of political pressure. As White Christian nationalism continues to surge in the U.S. in 2025, this antifascist confession of faith continues to call our church to confess Christ boldly, especially when voices of injustice and oppression seek to distort the truth.



THE SWASTIKA CROSSED OUT AND THE CROSS RISING. A protest and witness against Nazi tyranny and any effort to take the role of God and control of the church. THE FIRE. The suffering and death which follows from defense of the faith against tyranny, as for some of the Barmen signers. But the cross survives such persecution and the crisis of war, rising out of the flames.



## Historic Bible on Display

CPC churchgoers may not have noticed a polished wood and glass display case in the narthex to the left of the main door. A ledger of CPC donors has been on display there for some time, but now a new book is open and available for inspection.

It is a King James Bible published in 1869. It belonged to Music Director **Keith At**water's great-great -great grandfather David Tuthill, a farmer in upstate New York. Keith lo-



cated his grave in a small cemetery while on his recent vacation. Other Atwater ancestors were also found in small old village cemeteries nearby.

This Bible was new when David received it as a Christmas present. It's inscribed on the inside cover "to our father from his loving daughters." There were three daughters - Geneva, Margaret, and Nellie. Margaret later married and her daughter Daisy married Keith's great-great grandfather, Ellis King Atwater. The Bible appears to have been well used. Several slips of paper with penciled notes were

found throughout, presumably favorite scripture passages and probably Bible study, Sunday School, and/or sermon notes as well.

You'll see an original bookmark made of lace and ribbon, presumably made by




