New Inclusion Quilt Dedicated

On Sunday, November 2, CPC dedicated the new Inclusion Quilt that now hangs on

the west wall of the sanctuary. This quilt was the result of work by the CPC Inclusion Task Force (TF).

The Inclusion TF was established by session and began work in 2023. We were formed to help our church make changes to be more welcoming and affirming of LGBTQIA+ individuals and to establish a relationship with the Covenant Network of Presbyterians, an organization that supports PC(USA)

churches by educating and equipping them to be welcoming and fully affirming congregations. The Inclusion Task Force's responsibilities also include partnering with other churches and our presbytery to strengthen our mutual work, and sharing information with our session and congregation.

One of the things that our work with the Covenant Network taught us was that even if we have a mission statement like ours that says we welcome all, not everyone understands that it means them! Our pastors have taken leadership in including a statement every Sunday in our *Par*-

Stretching Your Food Closet Dollars

Shopping for groceries can sometimes feel challenging, especially when store specials seem designed for larger families. For instance, you may see deals such as four cans for \$5, but only need

two, or two boxes at a discounted price when you only want one.

These promotions might not always fit your needs, but there is a way to make the most of them

while helping others.

Maximizing Grocery Store Specials

The Food Closet provides an excellent opportunity to save money on your grocery purchases by using these store specials to benefit both yourself and our community. When you encounter a deal that offers more than you need—such as buying extra cans or boxes—consider purchasing the full special and donating the unused items to the Food Closet. Sometimes, the discounts are so significant that it makes sense to buy products you might not

use, like a cereal you do not eat, simply because the price is too good to pass up. The Food Closet gladly accepts these donations.

What to Donate

The Food Closet is espe-

cially seeking donations of nutritious and basic food items. Examples include peanut butter, jam (because who wants a plain peanut butter sandwich?), canned tuna, rice, spaghetti sauce, canned

fruits and vegetables, pasta, and cereal. These items help provide balanced meals to those in need.

How to Donate

You can easily contribute by dropping off donations at the church office on Sunday mornings, bringing them directly to the Food Closet any morning between 8:30 and 11:00 a.m., or coming to the church office Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Art Show

Windows to the Soul—Part 2 of 2

The current art display in the DeVries Gathering Place is "Windows to the Soul—Part 2 of 2" featuring photographs of CPC's stained glass windows taken by the late **Phil Mishler** and shared with us, along with the history of these windows by **Jimmi Mishler**:

In the late 1950s, CPC members Jimmi and Phil Mishler moved from Texas and joined Carmichael Presbyterian Church.

Over the years, they were involved in many areas, including choir, church school programs, marinership fellowship, and Heritage Committee, chaired numerous CPC committees, and served as Elders, to name a few.

A credentialed public-school teacher, Jimmi served as CPC's Director of Christian Education and served on the Heritage Committee from its inception in 1988 until she retired in 2019. She currently enjoys playing handbells at her senior residence and remains very active, enjoying life.

A graduate of Sacramento State College (now CSUS),



Phil was one of the first computer programmers for the state of California. He remained involved in information technology

throughout his career.

He also had a lifelong interest in photography. Phil took the photographs on display while preparing for CPC's 75th anniversary in 1998. Phil and Jimmi were such a good team.

The Chapel and Sanctuary windows were designed by Cummings Studios, then located in San Francisco. Design ideas are thought to have come from the book *Church Symbolism* by Ralph Addison Cram, 1938. **Nick Tomich**, architect of CPC's sanctuary, recalled in an interview:

"We were determined to have glass in it, leaded glass. You couldn't buy metal frames; metal was out of the question. So, we had wood frames built to hold the leaded glass. It was all done in San Francisco, in a studio. The wood windows were shipped down there and they installed the glass, and then... in the winter time (it must have been December), I borrowed my father's truck ... drove to San Francisco and brought this load of windows back. I recall it was about four in the afternoon. Ray May (the carpenter) was standing there, he hadn't gone home yet. I said, 'Ray, I have the windows for the Chapel.' He said, 'Well, I'm not going home. Let's get going, let's put 'em in here, it's going to rain.'

The next Sunday was the Sunday before Christmas."

The chancel stained glass windows were a happenstance discovery. Jimmi was

looking into the history of our windows for CPC's 75-year history book and learned that the Cummings Studio moved from California to Massachusetts. Jimmi contacted Bill Cummings, the studio owner, who said he would be happy to search for any historical information. During their conversation, he asked Jimmi if we had ever completed the chancel windows. Jimmi had no idea what he was talking about. Bill looked all over (even in his attic), and found the original drawings! Everyone was so elated and grateful for Jimmi's detective work.

Then, at Jimmi's urging, **Pastor Keith DeVries**' friend and stained glass artist, **Geraldine Esminger** brought the sketches to life, creating new windows using the original sketches for eight windows containing symbols depicting the life of Christ: Annunciation, Nativity, Epiphany, Baptism, Transfiguration, Crucifixion, Resurrection, and Ascension. The windows were installed in 2013.

In this art show, you will see Phil's photographs of the eight chancel windows, along with the apostle windows.

Many thanks to Jimmi Mishler for her hard work over the years preserving the history of our stained glass windows. As we honor and pay gratitude to Phil Mishler for his photographs, we know this was not an easy task. Depending on the season and light of day, the windows had to be illuminated just right to capture the beauty in a photograph. He loved photography, and we are proud to display such lovely work.

We are also grateful to Art Committee member **Clair Daugherty** who cut and stained custom matting for the photos.

Carmichael Presbyterian Church's stained glass windows tell an amazing story of faith, love and determination. This art show displays the second part of our beloved windows. Part one was shown in September 2022. Look around on a Sunday church morning and behold this blessing of such beauty; our windows may invoke a silent guide, inviting reflection, and an inner spiritual peace.

Charitable Donation Tax Changes



The new federal tax act signed into law in July 2025 made some important changes to the federal tax provisions for charitable contributions. These tax revisions will take effect for the 2026 tax year. The main changes that effect charitable donations are:

- Effective with the 2026 tax year, those individuals who use the standard deduction may also deduct cash donations to charitable organizations up to \$1,000 for single filers or \$2,000 for married couples filing a joint return. This change is meant to encourage individuals who take the standard deduction to increase their participation in charitable giving.
- Also effective with the 2026 tax year, those individuals who itemize deductions will only be able to take a charitable contribution tax deduction to the extent that their qualified contributions exceed 0.5% of their adjusted gross income (AGI). For example, a married couple with an AGI of \$100,000 who itemize deductions will only be able to claim charitable donations in excess of \$500.

It may be appropriate to review your charitable giving in light of these changes. Also, these changes only apply to the federal tax law and do not apply to state income tax. Each individual's tax situation is different and consulting with a tax or financial consultant may be appropriate.

There are other tax changes created by this tax act, some of which are effective in the 2025 tax year and others which will become effective in the 2026 tax year. 

- A Haven for Christmas by Patricia Davids (Fic Dav large print) Written by a Christian author, this is part of A North Country Amish Romance series that takes place in New Covenant, Maine. The characters are an Amish widow and an English cowboy with an addiction.

CPC Library Catalog Now Online



All 2,900+ books in the church library col-

lection have been entered into an online database. Here's how you can use it:

- 1. Go to https://www.librarything.com/catalog/carmichaelpres
- 2. Sort books by title, author, or date OR click on "search this library" in the upper right corner to search CPC's collection.
- 3. Each book has an icon that looks like the card of a card catalog (on the right next to the green "plus" sign). Click on that to see the book's details, including the Dewey Decimal (DDC), which can then be found in the church library. Please note, the DDC may vary slightly.
- 4. Come to the church library to check out the book(s) you've found. The church library is open on Sunday mornings and by appointment during church office hours (Monday-Friday 9:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m.).

Finding Resilience, Joy and Our Identity in Jesus Christ

In Part I of our Bible Study, we have been exploring find-

ing resilience in Jesus Christ. Now we shift to Part II -Finding our Joy. Lesson Four is entitled "The **Prodigal** Child. the Eldest Child.

Would women and girls hear this story differently and would it reveal the scriptures to us in a different way? Lesson 5 is equally intriguing. Entitled "The Gift of the Woman Who Was Poor," the lesson's main idea is that the joy

in Christ is more than happiness. For many people, joy

and happiness go hand in hand. Christians, however, can experience joy even when things are challenging. The joy



that we find in Christ can change horrible circumstances into faith-filled, even joyous times.




