From Pastor Keith And Then ...

It was a good idea—I thought! In 2019, after 38 years of ministry, it seemed like it was about time to plan a sabbatical. So, arrangements were made to travel to England and Scotland with our good friends, **Don and Barb Fox** in the summer of 2020.

And then... the world shut down as we found ourselves in the midst of a global pandemic. So, we regrouped, thinking we would try again in a year or two.

And then... **Jenny's** dad became our roommate for the next four years as he was no longer able to live on his own.

So, here's hoping the third time's the charm as I am planning sabbatical leave for May 15 – September 8, 2026. With 44 years of pastoral ministry in the rearview mirror, my sabbatical plans incorporate domestic travel, visits with friends and colleagues I have not seen in many months, years, or decades, and opportunities for retreat and study.

I will spend the first part of my sabbatical attempting to establish healthy rhythms and routines that will be carried forward during the remainder

of my ministry, including exercise, rest, reading, and spending more quality time with Jenny. I also hope to tackle some home projects during May and August that I never seem to find the time to address.

In June and July, I want to begin a journey of fostering healthy relationships, connecting and reconnecting, road tripping up and down the West Coast, and visiting with family and friends. At some point during the summer, I want to get to know my immediate neighborhood better as an acknowledgement of Fred Rogers' life and ministry with children in his TV show, “Mister Rogers' Neighborhood.” I am planning to host a BBQ in my front yard for any neighbor who might want to have a conversation and get to know their neighbors, too. I

also hope to spend time reading and studying at Zephyr Point and Princeton Seminary, before returning to my duties as your pastor on September 8.

But before I leave you for a season of sabbatical, I join with you, my siblings in Christ, as we enter the season of Easter, to celebrate the promise of new life, resurrection, and the empty tomb. In many ways the promise of new life and renewed life is embedded in the command to keep the sabbath holy, to commit a certain segment of time to God. It is the acknowl-

edgement that all humans need a good rhythm of work and rest, to relearn the importance of sabbatical practices, while rediscovering the sustaining promises of the God that we bear witness to as we embark upon this faith journey together.

Upon my return, I hope and pray that our time apart will reinvigorate and renew all of us for faithful service as God's Easter people.

He is Risen! He is risen indeed!


Current Art Exhibit "Reframing Beauty"

The CPC Art Committee is thrilled to showcase the photography of **Pastor Ivan Herman** in an exhibit titled "Reframing Beauty" now in the DeVries Gathering Place. This exhibit showcases selected photographs from Pastor Ivan's 2025 summer sabbatical.

Ivan has served as the Associate Pastor at Carmichael Presbyterian Church since 2009. He grew up in Ecuador and Colombia, and learned to take pictures of Andean landscapes with his grandfather's 1970 Yashica Electro 35.

Ivan previously served Presbyterian congregations in Memphis, TN, Washington, DC, and San Antonio, TX. He holds an annual pass to U.S.

National Parks as well as degrees from American Univer-

sity, Wesley Theological Seminary, and Wake Forest University. Ivan and his spouse, Susan, have two teen/young adult children.

During the summer of 2025, Ivan was granted a sabbatical to further goals of

mental, spiritual, intellectual, physical, and relational growth, much of it by contemplation through the lens of a camera. He traveled solo much of the time and with family some of the time. He visited nine national parks, monuments, seashores and national wildlife refuges, 18 state/county/private wildlife areas, two Presbyterian camps and conference centers, and took over 13,000 photographs.

The theme of the sabbatical was "Reframing Beauty." He expected to

capture beauty as an existential ideal, but discovered beauty in the little deviations from the norm. Even when conditions were not ideal—the photographer wasn't ready; the light faded; the smoke was thick; the subject too far away—there was still beauty to be found.

"God is beguiled by beauty into the work of creation by the beauty of the world. Imagining this beauty, our divine Beloved sings it into existence. At the same time, the beauty of the Good draws humanity and all creation back to its divine source." -Wendy Farley, *Beguiled by Beauty*

get many visitors. How about your friendly local car mechanic? We have so many touchpoints in our daily lives as we run errands, drop off kids at school, go to classes at the gym. Often we encounter the same people repeatedly, and are on at least a smiling, friendly footing with them. Why not ask? The worst that can happen is that they turn you down, and I think most of us could deal with that. Just keep the question light and friendly, and you might be surprised at the result.

Pastor Ivan Writes:

Caring for Neighbors; Living Resurrection

Happy Easter to all! In this season of resurrection, we are reminded that new life is joyful, and we find that joy in being together in community.

The risen Christ gathers people into community.

We are being restored, renewed, and reconciled to one another. This is the resurrected life we are called to embody right now.

One of the clearest expressions of this resurrection hope is how we care for our neighbors. We are especially mindful of those who arrive among us as strangers. Immigrants in our community carry stories of courage, loss, and longing for belonging. When we welcome folks with compassion and care, we participate in the good news of resurrection that transforms fear into trust.

At Carmichael Presbyterian Church our Easter mission is to welcome all, and to connect with and serve our community and the world. As a Matthew 25 congregation, we remember Jesus' lesson that

"I was a stranger and you welcomed me." (Matthew 25:35)

While local immigration enforcement actions have recently been limited to ICE check-ins rather than raids in

the community, there are multiple ways we can be prepared to respond in care for our neighbors who feel at risk. Churches in Minnesota have found value in forming three kinds of “pods” to care for their neighbors.

The Political Activist Pod is comprised of folks who would like to engage in faith-based activism, pressuring local, state, and national pub-

lic officials to make a public stand, support the community organizing work of Sacramento ACT (Area Congregations Together), and the PC(USA) Office of Public Witness in Washington, D.C. and New York City.

The Mutual Aid Pod is a great role for church folks and volunteers who are willing to drive children to school, deliver food closet groceries to homes, and connect with social workers in schools or refugee agencies. (Mutual aid volunteers should not be constitutional observers.)

The Constitutional Observer Pod is for those volunteers willing to be trained to respond to ICE sightings and participate in Migra Watch or Court

Watch. NorCal Resist provides regular trainings. Opportunities are also available for trained volunteer attorneys or volunteer non-attorneys to serve on Habeas Rapid Response Teams in immigration court.

As we celebrate the empty tomb, may we also open our hearts to our neighbors. If you would like volunteer for any of these pods, please contact me: ivan@carmichaelpres.org



Presbyterian Women Finding Resilience, Joy and Our Identity in Jesus Christ Study Continues

During our Study of Chapters 1 through 7 we reflected on Mary Magdalene the Tower, Mary of a Certain Village, Jesus is Tested, The Prodigal Child, The Gift of the Poor Women, Finding Our Joy in Christ: I will Say it Again, and the Women that was Bent Over. We continue our Study with Chapter Eight, Remembering Jesus' Baptism.

Lesson 8: Remembering Jesus' Baptism

Scripture: Luke 3:1-17, Mark 1:1-11, John 1:19-23

Main Idea: In baptism we are identified as God's own children charged to serve faithfully, justly and lovingly.

In this lesson we will first be reminded that when we were baptized, we or our guardian professed our trust in Christ and that we vowed to live our lives as Christ's faithful disciples. We will learn that our identity is through baptism as Christ claims us, and we are identified as children of God. We will discuss

various ways we learn who we are. We will learn through this discussion that in the end we are children of God and then we can reclaim who we are if we become lost. Further, we are reminded that as children of God we are also called to discipleship and charged to be participants in Christ's ministry of love, peace and justice.



Presbyterian Women will explore Lesson Eight "Remembering Jesus' Baptism" in Finding Resilience, Joy and Our Identity in Jesus Christ during April.

We will be reminded of Jesus' baptism and John the Baptist's baptism of Jesus and his message of our Baptismal rights. We will also learn how Jesus' baptism gave him his identity.

PW Pastor's Bible Study



In another take on Christmas, Richard Paul Evans in *The Gift* writes an inspiration-




al story of hope and faith and the redemptive power of love. It is shelved in the fiction section.

The original station opened in 1979, played classical music, and was operated by students from nearby Sac State. In 2000, jazz music and news were added to the station. In 2004, the station moved into its new building where there are no 90° angles. The walls are at a variety of angles and are covered with art works and paneling that also help to prevent echoes. We visited several rooms where we saw the variety of electronics used to create and project programs that we hear on Cap Radio. It was also interesting to meet some of the people who create and manage this station every day.

More details: Cap Radio membership provides 70% of funding for the station; on average there are 350,000 listeners a week; the average listener spends 15 minutes listening to headline news, local news, music, and advertising. It was an excellent tour!

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Harvey then introduced our guest speaker, his daughter Jennifer, whose forte is “Digital Mapping.” Jennifer has taught at Duke and is currently a professor at William and Mary University. She has an impressive resume including a degree in Geography and International Relations from UC Santa Barbara, a Master’s degree from San Diego State in Satellite Imaging, and a PhD from Oregon State University in Forestry.

Jennifer has used her expertise in satellite imagery to study the history of Mennonite farming in Bolivia and the controversial influence it has had on deforestation over the years. She also showed us mapped universal patterns of Mennonite colonies throughout the world. Her talk enlightened us to some of the things that the complex field of satellite imagery can do.

Jennifer’s presentation sparked many questions and lively discussions among her listeners. The meeting ended with a well deserved round of applause.

Skipjacks

Instead of Ireland (in honor of St. Patrick’s Day in March), we were treated to a travelog featuring Israel, Ja-

pan, India, and South Africa by our own **Keith Atwater**. CPC’s Music Minister described his “four tours in forty years” and illustrated them with pictures from books. His

hour-long talk held us spellbound as we learned about these countries.


A few highlights:

- **Israel in 1981:** Keith toured the Wailing or Western Wall & the Shrine of the Rock in the Old City, where he could hear the prayers from the minarets in Arabic, the Hebrew chants, and the Christian bells. He also went to Masada, visited a kibbutz and went to the Dead Sea where he said the water felt like hot suntan oil.
- **Japan in 2002:** Shinto is the
- **India in 2013:** Bangalore is the Silicon Valley of India with a population of 9 million. Keith went to a 500-year-old Hindu shrine, which is a popular destination of school field trips. There is a great contrast between urban and rural. For instance, a huge bookstore in the city featured rows of Steve Jobs’s new book, but in the country ox carts were used for hauling. Keith described the caste system, which is not used when Indians emigrate to the U.S.
- **South Africa, in 2020:** Keith went on a safari, stayed in hostels, rode in an open jeep, but walked a lot with gun toting escorts for protection against the animals. He toured Soweto where Desmond Tutu grew up & Nelson Mandela lived. An apartheid museum and Johannesburg were also on
